

GENDERED IMPACTS OF COVID-19: INSIGHTS FROM 7 COUNTRIES IN SUB-SAHARAN AFRICA AND SOUTH ASIA

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GENDER CLIMATE AND NUTRITION INTEGRATION INITIATIVE









EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

It is widely recognized that periods of crisis affect men and women differently, mediated by their access to resources and information, as well as social and institutional structures that may systematically disadvantage women from being able to access relief, institutional support, and rehabilitation. To capture the gendered impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic and lockdowns, we conducted phone surveys in seven countries spread across Asia and Africa. The study was designed as a longitudinal panel study with five rounds of data collection in Ghana, Nepal, Nigeria, and Senegal, and three rounds of data collection in Kenya, Niger, and Uganda. Both men and women were administered the same survey, with some modifications made across countries to adapt to local contexts. This report gives an overview of our findings covering several topics including income loss, coping strategies, labor and time use, food and water insecurity and child education outcomes. We find widespread reports of income loss, which declined over time, but increased again as countries experienced a resurgence in COVID-19 cases and fatality. We find that households first depleted savings when faced with income loss and over time, use of savings reduced while other measures began to be adopted. Women reported greater food and water insecurity compared to men, including worrying about insufficient food and eating less than usual. This is particularly worrying since a large proportion of women also did not have adequately diverse diets. Moderate to severe water insecurity was reported in many of the countries, and as with food insecurity, women were more likely to report issues with accessing water for drinking and other household activities. In some countries, additional modules were added to capture country specific issues of policy relevance, such agriculture extension, mental health, and child marriage. The results make it clear that proactive investments will be needed, including social safety nets, favorable credit policies, nutrition and water investments, to ensure that the crisis does not further widen the gender gap in resources and achievements in rural areas of low- and middle-income countries.

INTRODUCTION

The impacts of COVID-19 on women have been far reaching, affecting access to income and employment, savings and asset ownership, time-use and care burden, and food and water security. We use panel phone survey data from 7 Feed the Future countries- Kenya, Ghana, Nepal, Niger, Nigeria, Senegal and Uganda- to track the immediate and sustained gendered impacts of the pandemic and associated lockdowns on individual and household well-being. We also study coping strategies employed by households, focusing on who in the household-women or men- implement these strategies. Roughly 500 respondents- both male and female- were surveyed in each country.

We find that reports of income loss were high in all countries at the start of the pandemic, however this eased over time as restrictions began to be lifted but increased again as countries experienced the second wave of infections. In countries with late survey rounds income and food insecurity increased in later survey rounds. In all countries, more women than men reported being unemployed/notworking in the week preceding the survey, and barring Ghana, this trend worsened over the later rounds as more men resumed work, while women did not. We find that use of savings as a coping strategy declined over time in most countries, indicating that households deplete savings first when confronted with income shocks. Use of other strategies such as selling assets increased between the first and last rounds. Receipt of government transfers and assistance was low in all countries except Senegal and was generally limited to the first lockdown and declined sharply thereafter.

Women reported greater food and water insecurity compared to men, including worrying about insufficient food and eating less than usual. Food access changes are particularly troubling in countries where women do not have adequate diets. In Kenya, Niger, and Senegal, more than half the women did not consume minimally adequate diets. In Ghana, Niger and Senegal, women reported limited access to water for handwashing, a critical preventative step against COVID-19. As the pandemic continues, and the threat of future crisis looms, it is crucial to place women at the center of all national responses to COVID-19, to ensure that the gender gap does not widen dramatically.

Women and men experience, navigate, and cope with shocks and stressors differently, and their ability to mitigate and manage adverse impacts are mediated both by different preferences as well as different capacity to deal with shocks. These differences are determined in part by socio-economic factors, unequal access to resources, cultural constraints and formal and informal institutions that define the roles and responsibilities of women and men, and their ability to re-negotiate these roles when needed. Because both norms and institutional structures are determined at the local level, how shocks will impact women and men differently also needs to be studied at a granular level. The COVID-19 pandemic has been one such shock, that has affected every country in the world. While the health impacts of the disease continue to manifest globally, economic shocks due to strict lockdowns and movement restrictions have had particularly large impacts on the lives and livelihoods of the poor, especially women. Through this report, we aim to capture the different ways in which the pandemic and lockdowns have affected men and women in seven countries of Sub-Saharan Africa and South Asia, focusing on economic impacts, food and water insecurity, mobility and migration and risk management and resilience strategies adopted by households and individuals.

In most cases our respondents are concentrated in certain regions of the country and the study findings are therefore not representative at the country level (Table I). However, by covering several different countries, with varying levels of income, COVID-19 spread and differing degrees of lockdown and movement restrictions, we hope to capture the broad gendered impacts of the pandemic on the lives and livelihoods of the rural poor.

METHODOLOGY

In designing this survey, the team started with the conceptual framework that was developed for the Gender, Climate Change and Nutrition (GCAN) integration initiative which highlights the gender dimensions of climate shocks and stressors but can also be applied to think through gendered impacts of other types of shocks and stressors (Bryan et al. 2017). The impact of shocks and stressors on people are not direct but follow different pathways and are influenced by different factors including exposure and sensitivity, resilience capacities, decision-making context and responses. Access to WASH services, for example, support resilience capacities as do access to savings and assets. Some responses to shocks, such as depletion of agricultural assets, could be conceived as maladaptation leading to greater vulnerability to future shocks. As such, resilience is dynamic; and well-being outcomes influence future resilience capacities across an individual's lifetime.

The study was designed as a longitudinal panel study with five rounds of data collection in Ghana, Nepal, Nigeria and Senegal; and three rounds of data collection in Kenya, Niger and Uganda (Appendix Table 1). The findings presented here are based on these rounds of phone survey across all countries.

Key themes covered in the study include impact of COVID-19 lockdown on income and livelihoods, mobility, food and water security, nutrition, migration, education, and household conflict. Except for the modules on conflict and nutrition that were in some cases only administered to women, all other modules were directed at both female and male respondents. In some countries, additional modules were added to capture country specific issues of policy relevance, such as the module on agriculture extension and child marriage in Nepal. As far as possible, the survey instrument was kept the same across the countries, with some additions to the multiple-choice options based on country and local contexts, for example local foods in the dietary diversity module. The surveys cover a long time period, providing both breadth and depth of information of the gendered impacts of the pandemic, and how resilience strategies evolved as movement restrictions were relaxed or strengthened in response to the pandemic spread. In this report, we focus on comparisons across countries using the first and last available rounds of the survey for our analysis. While these do not strictly align, as the surveys were done at different times in the countries, they offer a snapshot of the main domains of risk and resilience and allow us to examine how these changed over time. Detailed tables, covering data from all rounds for the seven countries is available in the appendix.

In all countries, the sample was drawn from pre-existing surveys where phone numbers of respondents or households were available. To capture gendered impacts, both women and men were sampled for the surveys. Barring Senegal, only one person per household-female or male-was surveyed, and households were tracked over multiple rounds of surveys to form a panel. By building on existing surveys, we leveraged rapport with respondents, and where possible female enumerators were used to survey women. We ensured women were in private spaces before answering sensitive questions on intra-household conflict and checked for speakerphone use to ensure respondent privacy. Speakerphone use varied widely across countries. Among both men and women, speaker phone use was high in Ghana, Nepal, Nigeria and Senegal (Appendix Figure 1); however, the incidence of speakerphone use decreased over subsequent rounds as respondents became more familiar with the survey and enumerators.

Primary quantitative data were collected using structured questionnaires over the phone. Keeping in mind the lockdown restrictions and social distancing norms, the study was implemented using Computer-Assisted Telephone Interviewing (CATI) system, supported by the SurveyCTO platform. Incentives in the form of phone credit were offered to the respondents for completing each round of survey in all countries. Care was taken to ensure that women were reached at a time when they would be available to take the call. Multiple attempts were made to reach the women, as many times women were unavailable to take the call or were unreachable in the first try, especially when the number they were being reached on belonged to their family members or neighbors. Where households could not be reached for the second or subsequent rounds of the surveys, they were dropped from the sample and not resurveyed in any following round of data collection.

DEMOGRAPHIC PROFILE OF RESPONDENTS

Across all the seven countries, a majority of the respondents were engaged in agriculture and livestock rearing as their main source of income, and a much smaller proportion were engaged in other activities including self-employment. Unless specifically targeted, most households were male-headed, and except for Nigeria and Uganda, most respondents had low levels of education. In all countries except Niger, women were more likely than men, to be engaged in agriculture. In all seven countries women were more likely to have little to no formal education. In countries like Senegal and Niger, a sizeable proportion of women reported being voluntarily or involuntarily unemployed, and while some of this may have been driven by pandemic related job-losses, low female labor for participation rate in these countries has been documented by other publicly available datasets as well. In our survey for example, more than 25% of women in Senegal reported being unemployed. On the other hand, IMF and World Bank also estimate pre-pandemic female labor for participation in the country to be low. ¹

ECONOMIC IMPACT

Income loss and coping strategies

One of main impacts of the pandemic was on income loss, and this was felt acutely and widely across the globe. With many countries implementing strict restrictions on movement of goods and people within and across borders, economic activity slowed down significantly. In our surveys--with the exception of Niger--more than 70% households reported income loss in the first survey round. Over time however, the share of households reporting pandemic related income loss has declined sharply in countries like Nepal and Nigeria, and less so in other countries. Niger was the only country where the share increased between the first round in October 2020, and the second round in February 2021. This suggest that when conditions were changing in most countries that allowed households to resume economic activities or that over the medium term, households were adjusting their livelihood activities following the initial shock of the pandemic. These deep income shocks may also be one of the reasons that countries have been reluctant to impose strict lockdowns again, despite recent sharp increases in cases and fatality globally. However, with the second wave of infections spreading globally, conditions began to change again, with many countries where reports of income loss were falling previously, experiencing increased income loss reported by both men and women. In Uganda, people reporting income loss rose to 60-70% in June 2021 from under 50% in March 2021. In Nepal, the increase was more stark, women reporting income loss increased from 24% to 64%, while the same for men increased from 20% to 58%, between January and July 2021.

When we ask about who's income was affected, we see key differences over time and across countries. In Ghana, Kenya and Uganda, women were much more likely to say that their own income suffered due to the pandemic in the first round, however this trend had reversed in Ghana and Kenya by the third round with more men reporting own income loss. In Nepal and Niger men were more likely than women to report that their own income was affected in all rounds. On the other hand, in Senegal, the share of men

reporting income losses remained consistent but the share of women reporting their own income was affected increased sharply by the fourth round after declining in the second and third round.

Use of savings, was the most common coping strategy used by the households during the first round, however its use declined between the first and immediate subsequent rounds in most countries except Niger and Ghana. Since income shocks in Niger seem to have increased from a lower level in the first round it is not surprising that more households report using savings in the later round. Similar to income loss, with countries experienced increased cases during the last round of data collection, many more households reverted to using savings. In Nepal borrowing money and selling assets were two other common coping strategies. Selling assets increased as a coping strategy among respondents in Nepal from the first to the last round but declined in Kenya and Nigeria. We also asked about whether households received transfers from governments or NGOs, and we find that very few households received such support, with the exception of Senegal, where a large share of respondents reported receiving government transfers through the survey rounds.




FIGURE 2. Proportion of respondents who suffered from income losses due to COVID-19

Labor and time use

Due to both restrictions on mobility, and widespread job loss and economic slowdown, availability of work outside the home was severely curtailed during the pandemic. Indeed, most countries report high rates of unemployment in the past year, and a change in the occupation structure. When we look at the share of men and women who reported that they did not work outside the home in the week preceding the survey, in both the first and last rounds, we see that in Nigeria and Senegal, more respondents reported not working outside the home in the last survey round compared to the first. This is consistent with the late uptick of COVID cases in these countries. On the other hand, in Nepal where restrictions on movement were much more severe during the first survey round, the proportion of women and men reporting not working fell over time, despite a large second COVID wave. In addition, we also see that women were much more likely to report not working compared to men in all countries except Nepal. In Senegal, between the first and last round, we see a large spike in men reporting that they did not work outside the home, whereas the proportion of women working women increased sharply before falling significantly in the last two rounds. When we ask about how working hours compare to pre-pandemic times, we find that in Nepal and Niger the proportion of women who report working fewer hours compared to pre-COVID times, increased between the first and last round.

In addition to changes in work outside the home, pandemic restrictions, school closures and health shocks, have also brought about a change in the time spent by women and men performing care work. The time spent on care work reported by women was higher than that reported by men, across all countries and rounds. This gap was highest in Niger, where women spent nearly 50% more time on care compared to men, followed by Nigeria and Nepal, where this gap was over 30%. In Kenya, where during the first round the time spent on care by women and men was almost equal during the first round, over subsequent rounds women's care burden remained steady, while that of men declined steadily. By the third round, compared to men, women in Kenya were spending 60% more

time on taking care of children, of the elderly and of sick people in the household. In Senegal as well, women's time on care increased from 3.4 hours to 5.7 hours by the last round.

Impact on migration

Around 40% of households in Nepal, Niger, and Ghana, and around 25% households in Kenya, Senegal, Nigeria, and Uganda reported that they had members who have lived away from home for work in the last one year during the initial round of survey. Migrant members across all countries were pre-dominantly male. With lockdowns being imposed globally, migrant workers suffered job/income losses and many of them were forced to return home during this period. As a result, the proportion of households receiving remittances declined significantly across most countries. For households that continued to receive remittances, most shared that it was lower than what they were receiving prior to the onset of COVID-19. Additionally, there have been instances of new outmigration, particularly from Ghana, Senegal, and Nepal towards the later part of 2020 and early 2021 as lockdown restrictions were eased to a large extent across countries. As families are struggling with the financial crisis, income from remittances can be an important source for them to recover some of the income losses suffered during this period.

Box I: Gender and phone surveys

Challenges in reaching women through phone surveys

- South Asia and sub-Saharan Africa have the highest gender gap in phone access. Important intersectionality to consider as well- disadvantaged caste, religious, tribe and ethnic groups, and women from these groups especially lacking in access. When doing phone surveys, we are not able to adequate reach people and women from these disadvantaged groups.
- Women's mobiles phones may be considered a non-essential expense and be the first to be cut from household budgets.
- Intra-household disparity in phone access- women have to depend on husbands and sons for phone access
- Researchers may not be able to ensure respondent privacy in phone surveys. Especially if women are not in a private space when answering or if their phones are on speaker.
- Solution-hire trained female enumerators where possible, ensure institutional support from local and trusted NGO and/or institution, build on existing surveys where trust is established, time surveys during times when women are not engaged in care and household activities, keep surveys short to prevent survey fatigue.



IMPACT ON FOOD SECURITY AND NUTRITION

Issues of food insecurity and changes in access to food were reported by a large share of survey participants across countries. Our findings suggest that worrying about not having enough food remains high in many countries—more than 50 percent of men and women in almost all countries (except for Nepal) worried that they would not have enough food to eat. This remained largely unchanged by the last round of survey as well. A considerable share of respondents in Kenya, Niger, Ghana, Senegal, and Nigeria also shared that they ate less food than what they should in the initial round of survey. Among the 7 countries, highest proportion of respondents in Niger, Ghana, Senegal and Nigeria reported facing food insecurity in the two weeks preceding the survey, especially in the initial stages of the pandemic. Women were generally more likely to report issues of food insecurity than men.

Respondents in countries that were more worried about their food security also reported that access to food changed because of COVID-19. Some of the most common changes reported were inability to obtain enough food, eating less food, and, to a lesser degree, obtaining food from different sources or eating different types of food. These changes in food access can be more troubling in countries where women do not have adequate diets. Diet quality, measured by women's minimum dietary diversity (MDD-W), was particularly low in Uganda, Kenya, Niger and Senegal. The dietary diversity module was also administered to male respondents in Senegal, Kenya, Ghana, Nigeria and Niger. Men were more likely to have adequate diet diversity as compared to women in most countries. An equal proportion of men and women lacked diet diversity in Ghana and Nigeria. While it is encouraging that no gender-based differences were observed, it could also be linked to the relatively more severe food security crisis in these two countries that has affected men and women alike. In terms of the type of food consumed, a lower proportion of participants across most countries reported consuming less of the following food groups- dairy, eggs, nuts and seeds, and vitamin A rich fruits and vegetables.


THE ROLE OF WATER INSECURITY

Access to adequate WASH (Water Supply, Sanitation and Hygiene) facilities is critical for enabling people to fight COVID-19. The survey findings highlight challenges faced by households related to a poor WASH environment, especially in northern Ghana, but also to some extent in Niger, Nigeria, Senegal, and Uganda. Around 40% to 50% participants in Ghana, Niger and Senegal were worried about not having enough water in the two weeks preceding the survey, while about 35% were worried in Nigeria and Uganda (Figure 4). In Ghana where water insecurity was significant to begin with, the proportion of people reporting worrying about adequate water increased from 50% in the first round to 85% by the last round. More than half of female survey participants and about half of male participants in northern Ghana reported that they did not have water for washing hands after defecating, changing diapers, or cleaning animal dung (Appendix Figure 2), and this has worsened over time. Moreover, between 20% to 30% respondents in Uganda, Niger, Nigeria, and Senegal shared that there have been instances in the two weeks preceding the survey when there was not enough water to drink in their household (Figure 5); the corresponding figure for Ghana was around 50% in the first round, increasing to 70% by the last round. No gender-based differences could be observed with respect to issues of water insecurity faced by respondents in most countries, except in Ghana and Niger where more women were more likely to report constraints in water access.

The pandemic has also resulted in increased water consumption for over 50% households in Ghana, Kenya, and Nigeria, and for about one-fourth of the households in Nepal. Correspondingly, household expenditure on water has increased this year compared to last year, especially in Ghana and Nigeria, and to some extent in Senegal and Nepal. Given the financial losses suffered by households due to the COVID-19 induced lockdown, additional expenditure on water during this period may have exacerbated the negative impacts of the COVID-19 induced crisis.



IMPACT ON MOBILITY

People's mobility for carrying out various day-to-day activities was affected due to COVID-19, with some aspects being more severely affected than others. Going out for work, meeting friends and family, and attending group meetings were the activities most affected during the lockdown. With the easing of lockdown restrictions, mostly towards the later part of 2020, more people started going out to buy food and resumed work gradually. There have been certain gendered patterns with respect to mobility that could be observed across most countries. On the one hand, a higher proportion of men were going out for work, buying food, and meeting friends, as compared to women. On the other hand, the burden of fetching water and firewood for cooking mostly fell on women as a significantly higher proportion of women in most countries went out for these activities.

IMPACT ON CHILDREN'S EDUCATION

There have been significant efforts in developing nations to ensure adequate access to education, especially for girl children. However, with schools remaining closed for most part of the academic session between 2020-2021, students run the risk of dropping out permanently from school, thus nullifying the decades of efforts that have gone into mobilizing such a shift. To cope with the financial crisis faced by households, they may be compelled to get engaged in economic activities or may need to stay at home to help with household chores while elder members go out for work. It is also possible for students to lose interest in studies. Given the patriarchal systems in these countries which have resulted in lower importance being placed on girls' education, they are often the first to drop out of school in such contexts. As observed in Uganda, parental income loss and economic uncertainty due to the pandemic had forced some parents to marry off their underage daughters.

In most countries there has been a decrease in the proportion of children attending school post lockdown compared to school attendance before the onset of COVID-19. The decrease has been more for girl students in Ghana, Kenya, and Nepal. Online classes emerged as an important alternative for face-to-face classrooms during the pandemic. However, given the inequalities in access to mobiles and internet facilities among the poor in these countries, very few students from the surveyed households could participate in these classes.

HOUSEHOLD CONFLICT

Respondents were asked questions on household conflict they might have experienced in the two weeks preceding the survey. This included questions on whether they had any disagreement with their spouse, how easily they could work out problems together with their spouse, whether they were afraid of their spouse, and whether they were afraid of any other household member. These questions were asked only to married participants and only when they were in a private space and did not have their speaker phone turned on. As noted previously, a high proportion of respondents in Senegal, Nepal, Ghana and Nigeria had turned on their speaker phone during the survey, hence this module was administered to a small proportion of women in these countries.




FIGURE 6. Frequency of respondents' fights/disagreements with spouse

A higher proportion of women, compared to men, shared that they "often" or "sometimes" had disagreements with their spouse. The most common aspect of household conflict faced by respondents were with respect to working out problems together with their spouse. This was more evident in Senegal and Kenya with more than 80% and 60% respondents, respectively, sharing that they "rarely" or "never" could work out problems easily with their spouses. Around one-third respondents in the other countries except for Uganda reported the same. Interestingly, women in most countries said that they could work out their problems easily with their spouse while men felt otherwise; the converse was true for Nepal with more women reporting issues in working out problems together. Less than 10% respondents across countries, except for Ghana, shared that they feared (often or sometimes) their spouses or other family members during this period (Appendix Figure 4). Women were slightly more likely to report this than men. In Ghana, around 30% respondents were "often" or "sometimes" scared of their spouses or other household members in the two weeks preceding the survey.

OTHER IMPACTS

In some countries, additional modules on child marriage, emotional well-being and agriculture extension were added. We discuss findings from these additional modules below.

Child marriage

Only 6% of the survey participants in Nepal knew about underage girls (below 18 years) getting married since the COVID-19 lockdown during the second round of survey. Further, among households where at least one or more girls in the school going age-group were not attending school earlier this year, 17% shared that their daughters were married or going to get married and hence they did not return to school after the pandemic. In Uganda, a relatively higher proportion of households (18%) reported knowing of a family in their community who had gotten their underage daughter married due to the pandemic. The instances of child marriages that took place in Nepal during this period may not have been linked to economic stress since over 80% of those who got married had eloped with their partners without their families' approval. In Uganda, parental income loss and economic uncertainty were cited as the main reason for this. Encouragingly, almost all respondents in both Nepal and Uganda reported disagreement with marriage of underage girls. Additionally, in Uganda, almost half the respondents reported knowing or hearing about girls in their community becoming pregnant while schools were closed, highlighting the far-reaching impact of the pandemic on young girls, with implication for future health and human capital outcomes.

Emotional well-being

We administered the 20-question Center of Epidemiologic Studies Depression Scale (CES-D) in Nepal, and respondents were asked to rate, on a 4-point scale, how often they experienced different indicators of stress/depression in the week before the survey. A respondent is said to be clinically depressed if the CES-D score is 16 or above. Around 22% respondents in round 3 scored above 16 and were categorized as being depressed in the Nepal sample. This reduced to 16% in round 4. A considerably higher proportion of women (25% in round 3 and 19% in round 4) were found to be depressed as compared to men (12% in round 3 and 9% in round 4). The average score for male participants was around 8.5 in both rounds, while for female participants it was around 11 in both the rounds. The hardships that households have been exposed to due to the pandemic are likely to have affected family members emotionally, pushing them towards depression. It would also be closely linked to people's ability to cope with the crisis - vulnerable groups such as women and lesser privileged households with limited adaptive capacities are likely to suffer more emotionally in times of such crisis. These results highlight the need to account for mental health and wellbeing as part of crisis relief and rehabilitation.

Agriculture extension

The impacts on agriculture due to closed input and output markets, have been worsened by lack of access to reliable and timely agriculture information, in an environment where formal systems of agriculture extension are already lacking, and penetration of mobile phone and technology use is low. The module on agriculture extension access in Nepal, captured how women and men's sources of agriculture information shifted due to the lockdowns and what impact that had on agricultural productivity. We find that the dependence of women farmers on government extension agents or officials from Agriculture Knowledge Centres (AKC) was found to be very low prior to the lockdown. On the other hand, women reported increased reliance on friend, neighbors and their social networks following the lockdown, as well as own traditional knowledge. In round 1, around 53% female respondents in Nepal reported that the overall quality of information received by them from various sources had worsened since the lockdown. Women were more likely than men to report lower yields and pest attacks as a result of not being able to access timely information (Alvi et al, 2021).

POLICY CONCLUSIONS

The COVID-19 pandemic has severely affected vulnerable groups and led to substantial income loss, food insecurity, reduced nutritional diversity and overall magnified existing gender disparities. In many rural areas, in particular female-headed households lost access to important income from remittances, as migrants lost their jobs and returned to the farm, or could not return but were not able to generate income. Given the length of the pandemic, many rural households had to adjust coping strategies, first relying on savings, followed by borrowing and sale of assets, followed by further borrowing, reduction of key expenditures, such as schooling, charging mobile phones, as well as expenditures on more diverse diets and on calories with absolute declines in food consumption levels.

Women were more likely to report food insecurity challenges and many lacked access to healthy diets. A strong link between income losses due to the pandemic and diet adequacy was observed, with women's dietary quality improving during a period when COVID-19 cases had waned, and lockdowns were not in place. The impacts of the pandemic were far reaching for women and girls, including reports of child marriage and pregnancy in countries like Uganda and Nigeria, and severe negative impacts on mental health in Nepal.

In addition, women mostly had to add hours to their workday caring for sick family members, and their income opportunities outside the household declined, reducing their earning potential and widening the gender income gap. In many countries, access to water for drinking and handwashing was insufficient to comply with WHO recommendations of frequent handwashing. Moreover, in several locations, the cost of accessing water increased, while the quantity of water needed also rose due to the lockdown and additional family members in the household.

The redressal of these negative impacts would require both short-term strategies to help restore pre-pandemic conditions, as well as long-term strategies that aim to build women's resilience to minimize the impact of such shocks in the future.

Over the course of the pandemic, governments, multi-lateral organizations and civil society organizations have responded with a range of social protection measures, many of which are aimed at women and children. For example, the Government of Nepal (GoN) initiated several social protection measures to help people cope with the crisis, including the provision of food, reducing price of essential food items by 10%, and subsidizing electricity. The government also deposited employer and employees' social security contribution to Social Security Fund (SSF) during the period of nationwide lockdown (see also Box I). Informal sector workers who lost their jobs due to the ongoing crisis were given the opportunity to participate in public-works projects for a subsistence wage or received 25 percent of the local daily wage if they chose not to participate. Further, a lending program for cottage, small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs), and those in the tourism sector was instituted. However, no specific program was initiated to address the indebtedness that many rural dwellers entered into, including women and men farmers.

Box 2: Social protection measures following COVID-19

Nepal

- Delivery of in-kind relief package (food items and soap) for informal workers and deprived people with no caregivers (ILO).
- Electricity bills completely waived for households consuming up to 10 units per month, 25% and 15% discount on electricity bills for households consuming up to 150 units per month and those consuming up to 250 units per month, respectively (ADB, 2020).
- 10% reduction on prices of essential food items (ILO).
- Government deposited employer and employees' social security contribution to Social Security Fund (SSF) during the period of nationwide lockdown (ADB, 2020).
- Informal sector workers who lost their jobs due to the ongoing crisis were given the opportunity to
 participate in public-works projects for a subsistence wage or receive 25 percent of local daily wage should
 they choose not to participate (ILO; IMF; ADB, 2020).
- Lending program for cottage, small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs), and those in the tourism sector (IMF; ADB, 2020).

Ghana

- Coronavirus Alleviation Programme (CAP) to protect against job losses; protecting livelihoods; creating
 jobs; promotion of selected manufacturing industries; and supporting micro, small and medium scale
 enterprises (MSME) through soft loans worth GH¢600 million (Antwi-Boasiako et.al, 2021).
- Free water up to March 2021; free electricity for vulnerable (life-line customers) and 50% subsidy on electricity consumption for public utilities consumers (residential and commercial) up to March 2021 (Antwi-Boasiako et.al, 2021; APA News, 2021).

- Distribution of food and other supplies for the underprivileged during lockdown (MoFEP, 2020).
- Under the Livelihood Empowerment Against Poverty (LEAP) program, an additional one-off round of cash transfers to beneficiaries (transfers ranges between GH¢64 and GH¢106) in May (Dadzie & Raju, 2020).
- The Labour-Intensive Public Works (LIPW) program continued to provide work opportunities during the pandemic, especially in northern Ghana, at the prevailing national minimum daily wage (GH¢11.8 in 2020). LIPW reduced work hours to allow mothers and caregivers to attend to their children while continuing to pay full daily wages (Dadzie & Raju, 2020).

Kenya

- Weekly stipend of KSh.1000 to vulnerable households in the country bu Kenyan Ministry of Interior. Money to be distributed through M-Pesa mobile money service platform.
- KSh.4.37 billion to be paid to beneficiaries enrolled under the Inua Jamii cash transfer programs which
 include, orphans and vulnerable, older persons, and persons with severe disabilities. The beneficiaries are
 being paid Ksh.2000-Ksh.2700 per month.
- Between June and December 2020, 590,292,000KSh (about €4.6 million) is being transferred to 29,400 families in Nairobi and Mombasa informal settlements, in three monthly instalments by a consortium of seven NGOs, funded by EU and Danish and German government. The consortium is also providing cash assistance to approximately 3,835 survivors of sexual and gender-based violence in informal settlements.
- United Nations World Food Programme in partnership with Kenyan national and local government launched cash transfers for 24000 families in Nairobi and Mombasa. Each family to receive Ksh.4000 (US\$40) per month. Cash and additional nutrition support for women and children will be provided for three months.

Niger

- With the help of donor funding, the government announced state support for utilities such as electricity and water bills for vulnerable social groups for April and May, 2020.
- Scaling up of the National Adaptive Social Protection (ASP) program. In total 644,000 vulnerable people were provided food and nutritious assistance in September 2020 and an additional 1.5 million were targeted in October 2020.
- USD 3.5 million received from European Union in May 2020 through the United Nations World Food Programme to aid the most vulnerable affected by hunger and violence in Niger.
- USD 11 million from Global Partnership for Education (GPE) to mitigate the impact of the pandemic and strengthen the resilience of the education system. Special attention on the most vulnerable children, living in rural areas, girls, and refugee and internally displaced children.

Nigeria

- Economic stimulus plan of USD 605 million passed in June 2020.
- Vulnerable households affected by lockdown in states of Lagos, Ogun and FCT to receive food rations in April 2020, and internally displaced people to receive two months of food ration following lockdown. (Dixit et al, 2020)
- Starting April 2020, over 2.6 million poor and vulnerable households registered in National Social Register to receive cash transfer of Naira 20,000. Additional I million households to be added to the register. (Babatunde & Olagunju, 2020)
- Three month payment of salary to private workers through Survival Fund of federal government.

Uganda

- Cash transfers and food distribution to alleviate impacts of lockdown starting April 2020.
- Over 1.5 million individuals to receive food packages in Kampala, Wakiso and Mukono districts.
- Temporary cash for work scheme to support 500,000 people once implemented fully.
- Expanding Social Protection Program to deliver unconditional cash transfer of UGX 25,000 to senior citizen beneficiaries in all districts for 3 to 6 months.
- Disbursements started under National Special Grant for Persons with Disabilities worth 2 billion UGX to boost economic activity among groups of PwD.
- National security fund contribution requirements by employers and businesses relaxed.

Senegal

- Purchase of food for I million poor households and distribution of food kits through allocation of 69 billion FCFA by government.
- Two month utility subsidy to nearly 1 million vulnerable households for electricity and 670,000 households for water starting May 2020.

In response to the pandemic, the Government of Kenya allocated temporary special benefits for single-parent households and expanded cash transfers under the National Safety Net Program to elderly people, orphans, and other vulnerable groups. In Ghana, along with distribution of food and household supplies, subsidies on essential utilities like water and electricity were also instituted as

temporary measures. In addition, cash transfers were made under existing programs and Ghana's work-fare program was strengthened and adapted to suit the needs of the beneficiaries, especially mothers and caregivers. However, our surveys show that despite these range of schemes, barring a few countries, very few households reported receiving government or NGO assistance during the pandemic and had to resort to coping strategies, such as depleting savings and assets, which can have long-term negative effects. These effects may be worse for women given that their savings and assets may be depleted more quickly and because they were likely starting with a lower level of financial capital. Despite relaxation of restrictions on mobility, impacts on food insecurity continued to be felt in later rounds of the survey, especially for women.

Where analysis disaggregated by occupation was possible, we found that agriculture emerged as an important and more resilient sector, compared to the non-farm sector, and therefore, policy action to ensure productivity and well-being of farmers would be of critical importance to crisis rehabilitation. Addressing these negative impacts will require both short- and long-term strategies to help men and women cope with the ongoing pandemic and begin to restore income and accumulate assets to build resilience to future shocks. For women, the findings from our phone surveys suggest that interventions should best focus on saving time of women, reducing their indebtedness, and enriching their nutritional outcomes as well as that of their families.

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




APPENDIX FIGURE 2. Frequency of not washing hands when necessary⁵







Figure A5.1: Nepal COVID-19 trajectory and study timeline






Figure A5.3: Nigeria COVID-19 trajectory and study timeline




Figure A5.4: Senegal COVID-19 trajectory and study timeline




Figure A5.5: Kenya COVID-19 trajectory and study timeline




Figure A5.6: Niger COVID-19 trajectory and study timeline




Figure A5.7: Uganda COVID-19 trajectory and study timeline
