GENERAL OUTLOOK

ETHIOPIA

In Ethiopia, nearly 10 million people, including 4.4 million children, are in urgent need of humanitarian assistance in drought-impacted areas. (UNICEF, Jul 19 2022)

Four consecutive failed rainy seasons have brought on severe drought in Ethiopia's lowland regions of Afar, Oromia, the Southern Nations Nationalities, Peoples' (SNNPR) and Somali regions. Water wells have dried up and millions of livestock have died, resulting in mass displacement. Malnutrition rates are increasing at an alarming rate due to the drought. Across the four drought-impacted regions, an estimated 600,000 children will require treatment for severe acute malnutrition by the end of the year. In the Somali region, there has been a 43% increase in severely acute malnutrition admissions(SAM) for under 5 children in May 2022 compared to May 2021.



KENYA

Drought conditions have persisted in ASAL counties (Arid & Semi-Arid Lands) following multiple failed successive rain seasons. This has led to conditions of severe to extreme vegetation deficit coupled with challenges of access to water. This has led to increased trekking distances to water points and grazing sites for livestock, leading to worsening livestock body condition scores and mortalities in some pockets of Garissa, Wajir, Marsabit, Isiolo, and Mandera.



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The trend in the distance trekked by livestock in search of water sources from grazing areas, compared to the previous month, has continued to worsen across most counties. 74% of counties were above the Long Term Average with most counties being on a declining trend.

The drought emergency has worsened. 7.7 million people, or about half of the population, require humanitarian or protection aid. At least 7 million people have been affected by the drought,

SOMALIA

with 918,000 displaced in search of water, food, and pasture, including members of minority groups. Available reports point to a reasonable chance that famine may occur in 17 districts if crop and livestock production fails, food prices continue to climb, and humanitarian aid is not sustained to reach the most vulnerable

The number of districts under Operational Priority Area (OPA) 1 has increased from 26 to 34 due to a spike in the number of people facing catastrophic levels of food insecurity (IPC Phase 5). There is need for urgent humanitarian assistance to be scaled up to avert catastrophic hunger & starvation.

KEY NUMBERS

WORSENING HUMANITARIAN **SITUATION**

The nutrition situation in the region is becoming catastrophic as malnutrition rates rise, notably in Ethiopia and the Arid & Semi-Arid Lands (ASALs) of Kenya & Somalia, with more than 1.8 Million expected to be wasted in 2022 alone.

INCREASED MORTALITIES

A 247% increase in mortalities in Somalia & Ethiopia (Afar & Somali regions) compared to same period last year. 66 children have been reported dead due to malnutrition in Somalia alone.

112,448 PEOPLE DISPLACED SINCE JUNE

This is in June alone which is **231%** more than in May. **60%** of the new arrivals went to Mogadishu. About 72% of movements were inter-regional, unlike in May, when 64% were intra-regional

86% INCREASE IN CHILDREN WITH SEVERE ACUTE MALNUTRITION

The rapidly deteriorating malnutrition situation in Ethiopia, Kenya, and Somalia, has resulted in an increase in admissions of children with Severe Acute Malnutrition (SAM) over the past six months compared to previous years. In Somalia, the number of children receiving treatment for SAM increased by 86 percent in the first two quarters of 2022 compared to the same period in 2021, as indicated by the admission trends (Source: ACF Nutrition centres). Kenya and Ethiopia has recorded steeper increases in SAM admissions this year with first guarter admissions 68% & 37% higher in 2022 compared to last year (Nutrition Cluster).

Action Against Hunger's response is focused on preventing excess mortality and life-saving assistance to most affected areas



387.7 TONNES TO BE DELIVERED

Against Hunger is leading the coordination with health & nutrition partners to utilise the support provided by EU Humanitarian Aid. The Humanitarian Air Bridge was launched to deliver medical & nutritional supplies to hard-to-reach areas in Somalia.



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STRATEGIC OBJECTIVES OF THE RESPONSE

OVERVIEW



186% INCREASE IN OUTREACH ADMISSIONS

In July 2022 (1-25th) a total of **7521 children** under 5 were admitted in nutrition sites across our facilities in July. Across partners in Baidoa district there is a **253% increase in SC admissions** and **186% increase** in OTP (Outreach Posts) admissions comparing Jan-June 2022. In Bakool Region, a total of **38,923 malnourished children** admitted across the various health facilities.

213,000 PEOPLE FACING IPC PHASE5

213,000 people across Somalia now face **catastrophic hunger &** starvation (IPC Phase 5). The poor Gu season crop harvest will lead to a continued deterioration in the food security situation especially with the upcoming Hagaa dry season (July to September).

6.4 MILLION LACK ACCESS TO WATER

Nearly all districts in Somalia (71 of 74 districts) are in acute need of water, hygiene & sanitation support. 6.4M people lack access to safe water & sanitation which has compounding effects on public health.



918,000 DISPLACED BY DROUGHT

from their homes in search of water, food and pasture; including minority groups. Majority of displaced persons have self-settled in over **2,400** sub-standard IDP sites in urban and peri-urban areas across the country



7,796 CHOLERA CASES REPORTED

36 deaths & 269 cholera cases were reported in the epidemiological week 27, with 5 deaths. 60% of the AWD/Cholera cases are children < 5 years. Laboratory findings revealed evidence of Rota virus infection among these children. **72% of the cholera deaths** are children < 5 years. (Source: Somalia Health cluster/ WHO)







172,357 USD IN MEDICAL SUPPLIES

With Funding from ECHO, WHO is providing medical supplies to Caafimad Plus partners with Action Against Hunger coordinating. The first round of OCV campaign was implemented by WHO in **9 high risk** districts between 14-26th June 2022, reaching 897,086 people.







OUR RESPONSE

102,184 CHILDREN UNDER 5 64,970 girls & 59,973 boys were screened for acute malnutrition between Jan & June 2022; of which 15,341 children (8,572 girls & 6,769 boys) suffering from Severe Acute Malnutrition (SAM) were admitted to the program for treatment with a **98.6%** cure rate.

55,664 BENEFICIARIES OF WATER TRUCKING

In response to the critical water shortages for both human and livestock use, 10,019 girls, 8,350 boys, 18,369 women & 18,926 men, received water through water trucking interventions that brought water to the affected communities.

185,650 MULTI-PURPOSE CASH **ASSISTANCE BENEFICIARIES**

across Action Against hunger Food Security & Livelihoods programming. 800 households received Livestock treatment. **350 Fresh Fruit Vegetable beneficiaries** for Mother with Children in SAM in Bayhaw Mean Corpuscular Health(Aug-Oct). 785 households received agricultural inputs (crop, vegetables and agro-forestry seeds & seedlings, tools).

GAPS



MAM SERVICES SUPPLIES GAPS

Decreased TSP sites across the country with 66 active sites in Bay & Bakool. This coupled with the high MAM admissions is not adequate in reaching the moderately malnourished children. Somalia is experiencing global supply issues for commodities used for its nutrition programme combined with funding gaps.



ONLY 30% OF THE HUMANITARIAN RESPONSE PLAN (HRP) FUNDED

Back in 2017, not only had humanitarians received **US \$572 million** (58% of the HRP *ask*) by this time of the year, but they already had also more than three times more funding available by March. The current funding situation is more comparable to 2011 (**30% of the HRP** funded), when funding was slow until the declaration of famine, with devastating consequences including **260,000 deaths**. The health sector is facing limited funding in responding to the looming needs receiving only **11% of the funding** needed.

ROTA & CHOLERA CASES RISING



Rotavirus is the leading cause of Acute Watery Diarrhea in malnourished children. Hence need for Rotavirus vaccination for young children. Drought-affected districts reported 7,796 cholera cases, including 36 deaths (case fatality rate of 0.43 %), by the end of June. Source

STRATEGIC OBJECTIVES OF THE RESPONSE

OVERVIEW



DROUGHT DUE TO LOW SEASONAL AVERAGES

The drought situation continued to worsen in 20 of the 23 Arid & Semi-Arid Lands (ASAL) counties. The number of counties in the Alarm stage of drought has increased from 5 in May to 8 in June 2022. The counties in Alarm drought phase are Mandera, Marsabit, Wajir, Laikipia, Tharaka Nithi, Turkana, Samburu & Isiolo.



RISING FOOD PRICES & CONFLICTS

Low seasonal averages of rainfall was received across most livelihood zones was low. This negatively also sparked resource-based conflicts coupled with rising food commodity prices due to depressed crop production that coincides with the peak lean season for most Arid & Semi-Arid Livelihood counties.

FOOD INSECURITY: EMERGENCY (IPC AFI PHASE 4)

The Acute Food Insecurity analysis update indicated that Mandera & Wajir counties have shown a huge deterioration, shifting from **Crisis to Emergency** (IPC AFI Phase 3 to Phase 4). The remaining 10 of 12 counties analyzed have exhibited a deterioration in populations classified in IPC Phase 3 or higher.



LIVESTOCK MORTALITY

Drought conditions have persisted in ASAL counties following multiple failed successive rain seasons. This has led to conditions of severe to extreme vegetation deficit coupled with challenges of access to water leading to increased trekking distances to water points & grazing sites for livestock, leading to worsening livestock body condition scores.



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EXTREME CRITICAL SITUATION IN MANDERA Mandera county's March SMART survey found **GAM rates (Global Acute** Malnutrition) of 34,7%. Mandera is now classified as an Extremely Critical situation (IPC AMN Phase 5) from March-May. 942,500 children aged 6-59 months are acutely malnourished & need treatment. In Mandera alone, the number of children in need of treatment has increased to nearly **126,140**, representing an **increase of 30%**.

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OUR RESPONSE



113,114 BENEFICIARIES TARGETED

Action Against Hunger is currently implementing an Integrated Drought Emergency Response project in Isiolo & Mandera County targeting 65,586 females & 67,528 males beneficiaries for Nutrition, WASH, Foods security & livelihoods, & cash transfer interventions.



NUTRITION IN MANDERA & ISIOLO

Providing essential & life-saving nutrition services among the crisis affected populations in Isiolo and Mandera Counties targeting **56,514 direct** beneficiaries & **113,027 Indirect** beneficiaries

39,300 FOOD ASSISTANCE BENEFICIARIES

Implementation of cash transfers among the drought affected people in Mandera & Isiolo Counties targeting 6,550 households directly reaching **39,300 beneficiaries** with food Assistance interventions

MANDERA'S SITUATION

Immediate food provision at household level especially in Mandera county that requires blanket supplementary feeding.





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35,300 WASH BENEFICIARIES

Distribution of WASH Non-Food Items (Buckets, Jerry Cans, Soaps) among people in Mandera & Isiolo counties to 5,500 households & distributions of (in-kind) dignity kits for menstrual hygiene management (MHM) to 2,300 women & girls of reproductive age.

1.235 METRIC TONNES OF RANGE CUBES

Through the **BHA funded project**, Action Against Hunger is in the process of procuring 24,700, 50 kgs range cubes bags for **9,500 households** & livestock owners & **500K** livestock.

ACCESS TO SAFE WATER

Increase access to safe water supply & adoption of optimal hygiene and sanitation practices to drought affected population in Isiolo & Mandera counties.

DIRE NEED FOR FUNDING

Funding to be able to respond to the emergency. With an increase in the populations of the people in dire need of humanitarian assistance, there is need to increase and allocate more resources to the increased needs with a key focus on saving lives while putting in place recovery mechanisms for the communities to bounce back after the drought.

STRATEGIC OBJECTIVES OF THE RESPONSE

OVERVIEW

7 MILLION PEOPLE NEED FOOD ASSISTANCE 4 MILLION PEOPLE NEED WATER ASSISTANCE

Communities in south & eastern Ethiopia are suffering from a devastating drought following four consecutive failed rainy seasons since late 2020. Parallel to lifesaving interventions, resilience programming is key to build the resilience of chronically drought-affected communities in these areas. Forecasts indicate, there is a risk of further deterioration in the coming months & yet another failed rainy season later in Oct-Dec.

4.5 MILLION IDPS (IOM, FEB 2022)

More than **334,000 people** who have the means to travel have migrated since October last year, leaving behind their elderly & the sick family members. Movement of communities heightens the risk of disease transmission (both humans & livestock) due to high population concentration & weakened immunity. The longer the drought condition persists, the weaker they become exposing them to illnesses, including water-borne & skin diseases.

16.2 MILLION IN NEED OF WASH SERVICES

An estimated 16.2 million people need WASH services across Ethiopia including **8.6 million people** in Afar, Amhara and Tigray. Water is at critical levels, also leading to increased risks of water-borne diseases. Only in Somali region, at least **2.3 million** people in **85 woredas** are in need of water trucking services. In Oromia region, more than 600,000 people need water trucking. Furthermore, **809,000** have been affected by the hydrological drought in 21 woredas of SNNPR.

2.6M REACHED IN DROUGHT AFFECTED AREAS

Since the start of the year, protection partner's assisted 1.8 million people, **22%** of the **7.9 million people targeted**, of which 35% are women, 25% are girls, 20% are boys, and 20% are men.

99 MOTHER-TO-MOTHER MEMBERS

436 under two children caregivers & 99 Mother-to-Mother support group members received individual IYCF counselling & group discussion on Nutrition at Girawa and Bedeno Woredas.



EMERGENCY FOOD & CASH

Action Against Hunger's Hararge base has facilitated an Emergency cash & food assistance (E2A) project Government lead final evaluation & official close out event at Harar town



109 SEVERE ACUTE MALNUTRITION (SAM) CASES ADMITTED AT **OUTREACH POSTS (OTP)**

In Girawa & Bedeno Woredas of Hararge zone in Oromia region, **109 & 49 SAM cases** admitted at outreach and health centers in last 2 weeks.
