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STATUS REPORT ON BEHALF OF RESPONDENT NO. 1 IN COMPLIANCE WITH ORDER DATED 21.01.2022 PASSED IN THE CAPTIONED EXECUTION APPLICATION.

#### MOST RESPECTULLY SHOWETH:-

- 1. The present status report is being filed on behalf of Respondent No.1 through the Wetland Authority of Delhi in furtherance of the status report dated 12.08.2022, in compliance of the order dated 21.01.2022 passed by this Hon'ble Tribunal.
- 2. The issue under consideration in the captioned application pertains to the remedial action taken/to be taken to ensure rejuvenation of the Najafgarh Jheel (Lake) situated on the Delhi-Gurgaon border. The water body thus falls partly in NCT of Delhi and partly in Haryana.
- 3. That the Respondent No.1 submitted a detailed status report dated 12.08.2022 and the same is not being reiterated herein for

the sake of brevity, which may be kindly read as a part of this present report.

4. The following developments and/or actions have been taken since the submission of the last report:

#### (i) Status of Water Quality

The monitoring of water quality is being done on quarterly basis by the Delhi Pollution Control Committee (hereinafter referred to as '**DPCC**'), the latest report data dated 20.10.2022 is presented as follows: -

- 5. All requisite information was collected from the stakeholder departments such as Development Department (Agriculture Unit), Delhi Jal Board (DJB), DPCC, Forest & Wild life, I&FC, Power, Public Works Department (PWD), Revenue (South West), Municipal Corporation of Delhi (MCD) and submitted to the Inter-Ministerial Expert Group (hereinafter referred to as the 'IMEG') formed by the Ministry of Environment, Forests and Climate Change (hereinafter referred to as 'MoEF&CC').
- 6. The IMEG has prepared a draft report for conservation and rejuvenation of the Najafgarh Jheel and has requested for comments from members of the IMEG.

7. The most recent meeting with all concerned departments and stakeholders was conducted on 17.11.2022 by Wetland Authority of Delhi. This was the fifth meeting and the following actions were reported by the responsible departments. Appropriate budget shall be provided by GNCTD for the following actions, if necessary:-






